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CAL Poly Pomona Interview Questions And Answers Guide.

Question - 1:

What type of salary are you looking for?

Ans:

This can be a very tricky question as the individual asking it is probably digging for something other than a simple answer to the question. We recommend that you don't immediately respond to the question directly. Instead, say something like, "That a difficult question. What is range for this position?" More often than not the interviewer will tell you. If the interviewer insists on direct answer you may want say that it depends on the details of the job - then give a wide salary range.

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Question - 2:

Do you ever take work home with you?

Ans:

Here are two great sample answers that might help get you started:

* I am an extremely organized person, so I tend to be able to get my work done at work. However, if the need arose I would not be against taking work home. I try not to make it a habit, since I do value my free time. I do realize though that the work we do is important, and sometimes you have to do what needs to be done.

* I do not shy away from taking work home with me. I know that meeting deadlines and doing outstanding work sometimes means taking a bit of it home. I do not have a problem doing that when the need arises.

* Make sure to give an honest answer. Lying about taking work home may turn out badly for you if it is required and you do not do it.

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Question - 3:

Explain what are your weaknesses Regarding CAL Poly Pomona?

Ans:

Red flags: This is the peanut butter to the previous question's jelly. Again, everyone should expect it, so it's a bad sign if someone seems totally unprepared, or gives a stock answer like, "I'm a perfectionist." Also, of course, candidates crazy enough to blurt out some horrible personality trait should go in the red flagged pile.

Good answer: Candidates should talk about a real weakness they've been working on improving. For instance, they're not good at public speaking, but they've been taking a course to help them improve. Or maybe they feel that they're easily distracted when working online, but have installed software that helps them stay on task.

Answers like these show a desire for improvement, self awareness and discipline.

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Question - 4:

Tell me about a time when you had to give someone difficult feedback Regarding CAL Poly Pomona?

Ans:

By asking this question, your interviewer hopes to learn whether you can communicate effectively, address issues in the workplace and motivate others during difficult times. Giving negative feedback requires honesty, thoughtfulness and tact. Answering this question well can help show an interviewer that you would be a good fit for a managerial position or a position that involves working closely with others.

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Question - 5:

What is your dream job?

Ans:

There is almost no good answer to this question, so don't be specific. If you tell the interviewer that the job you're applying for with his/her company is the perfect job you may lose credibility if you don't sound believable (which you probably won't if you're not telling the truth.) If you give the interviewer some other job the interviewer may get concerned that you'll get dissatisfied with the position if you're hired. Again, don't be specific. A good response could be, "A job where my work ethic and abilities are recognized and I can make a meaningful difference to the organization."

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Question - 6:

Describe a time when you anticipated potential problems and developed preventive measures?



Ans:

The key here is to show that you were proactive. How did you find out about the potential problems? How did you address it quickly?

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Question - 7:

What is your greatest strength Regarding CAL Poly Pomona?

Ans:

This is your time to shine. Just remember the interviewer is looking for work related strengths Regarding CAL Poly Pomona. Mention a number of them such as being a good motivator, problem solver, performing well under pressure, being loyal, having a positive attitude, eager to learn, taking initiative, and attention to detail. Whichever you go for, be prepared to give examples that illustrate this particular skill.

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Question - 8:

Can you explain why you changed career paths Regarding CAL Poly Pomona?

Ans:

Don't be thrown off by this question-just take a deep breath and explain to the hiring manager why you've made the career decisions Regarding CAL Poly Pomona you have. More importantly, give a few examples of how your past experience is transferable to the new role. This doesn't have to be a direct connection; in fact, it's often more impressive when a candidate can make seemingly irrelevant experience seem very relevant to the role.

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Question - 9:

Did you consider yourself a team player?

Ans:

Of course you're a team player - who isn't. But a simple yes probably isn't the response the interviewer is looking for. Be ready to provide specific example of how you've worked as part of a cohesive team to get things accomplished and how you've focus on team performance rather than individual performance. Make sure not to brag as this will make it appear as that you're more concerned about your own performance and accomplishments than those of the team.

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Question - 10:

What critical component of this position Regarding CAL Poly Pomona makes the work challenging?

Ans:

Heading information: This should include job title, pay grade or range, reporting relationship (by position, not individual), hours or shifts, and the likelihood of overtime or weekend work.

Summary objective of the job: List the general responsibilities and descriptions of key tasks and their purpose, relationships with customers, coworkers, and others, and the results expected of incumbent employees.

Qualifications: State the education, experience, training, and technical skills necessary for entry into this job.

Special demands: This should include any extraordinary conditions applicable to the job Regarding CAL Poly Pomona (for example, heavy lifting, exposure to temperature extremes, prolonged standing, or travel).

Job duties and responsibilities: Only two features of job responsibility are important: identifying tasks that comprise about 90 to 95 percent of the work done and listing tasks in order of the time consumed (or, sometimes, in order of importance).

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Question - 11:

Tell me about a time when you had to use your presentation skills to influence someone's opinion Regarding CAL Poly Pomona?

Ans:

Example stories could be a class project, an internal meeting presentation, or a customer facing presentation.

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Question - 12:

Where do you see yourself in five years? Ten years?

Ans:

Bad Answer: A generic or uninspired answer. Also, answers that show that this career/company is just a temporary stop for them.

Good answer: One that shows the candidate has thought about this question, has plans, and that those plans align with the job and a career path that is possible in the company. You want to see that this candidate is a good long term investment.

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Question - 13:

How did you hear about the position Regarding CAL Poly Pomona?

Ans:

Another seemingly innocuous interview question, this is actually a perfect opportunity to stand out and show your passion for and connection to the company and for job Regarding CAL Poly Pomona. For example, if you found out about the gig through a friend or professional contact, name drop that person, then share why you were so excited about it. If you discovered the company through an event or article, share that. Even if you found the listing through a random job board, share what, specifically, caught your eye about the role.

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**Question - 14:**

What's your management style?

Ans:

The best managers are strong but flexible, and that's exactly what you want to show off in your answer. (Think something like, "While every situation and every team member requires a bit of a different strategy, I tend to approach my employee relationships as a coach...") Then, share a couple of your best managerial moments, like when you grew your team from five to 15 or coached an underperforming employee to become the company's top employee.

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Question - 15:

Have you ever you have been in a position Regarding CAL Poly Pomona where you've had to fire someone? How did you feel about that experience?

Ans:

Be very thoughtful about your answer. This is a very serious matter for most companies and requires a very serious answer. You need to express that you will do it when it is the right thing to do but you don't want to give the impression that you're callous to the process. Don't forget that firing is not the same as laying someone off - it typically is for the direct benefit of the company.

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Question - 16:

If you felt like you were hitting the proverbial "wall" and getting burned out, what would you do to re-energize yourself?

Ans:

Take a break to rest. Work in smaller increments of time to increase focus with breaks in between. Delegate tasks to those that are willing to help.

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Question - 17:

Do you have any blind spots?

Ans:

This question is often meant to trick candidates since acknowledgment of blind spots would indicate they were aware of them. Also, do not disclose bad habits or other personal concerns. Let the interviewer find out about your personal flaws through the course of the interview without directly stating these flaws.

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Question - 18:

Why are you leaving last job?

Ans:

Although this would seem like a simple question, it can easily become tricky. You shouldn't mention salary being a factor at this point Regarding CAL Poly Pomona. If you're currently employed, your response can focus on developing and expanding your career and even yourself. If you're current employer is downsizing, remain positive and brief. If your employer fired you, prepare a solid reason. Under no circumstance should you discuss any drama or negativity, always remain positive.

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Question - 19:

What qualities do you look for in a boss?

Ans:

Remain optimistic and do not be too specific. Good attributes include moral character, honesty, and intelligence since managers usually believe they possess these qualities.

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Question - 20:

Tell me about a time when you had to make a decision without all the information you needed. How did you handle it Regarding CAL Poly Pomona? Why? Were you happy with the outcome?

Ans:

In many scenarios, you will not have all the information needed. The key is to make the best possible decision based on what you deem to be a sufficient amount of information.

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Question - 21:

Would you like doing repetitive work?

Ans:

Why not, I am not only doing a repetitive work but also earning but also getting a good salary by the company Regarding CAL Poly Pomona. And second thing is that nothing is interesting in the life till we are not interested.

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Question - 22:

Are you currently looking at other job opportunities?

Ans:

Just answer this question honestly. Sometime an employer wants to know if there are other companies you're considering so that they can determine how serious you



are about the industry, they're company and find out if you're in demand. Don't spend a lot of time on this question; just try to stay focused on the job you're interviewing for.

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Question - 23:

What did you like least about your last (or current) job Regarding CAL Poly Pomona?

Ans:

Don't vent or focus on the negative with brutally honest answers such as "My boss was a jerk," or "The company culture was too politically correct," or "They just weren't giving me the opportunity to take my career to the next level." Instead, keep the emphasis on the positive, even though there are sure to be things you weren't happy about.

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Question - 24:

Your client is upset with you for a mistake you made, how do you react?

Ans:

Acknowledge their pain - empathize with them. Then apologize and offer a solution to fix the mistake.

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Question - 25:

If you have multiple projects on your plate, how do you handle completing them on time?

Ans:

Prioritize based on business importance. Set clear timelines for each so that you know which ones to knock out first. Get your teammates to help if necessary.

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Question - 26:

You notice there are too many non productive internal meetings being held, what do you do?

Ans:

Reach out to your boss and let him know that first you value his leadership and organization but that you are being overwhelmed with the amount of non productive internal meetings.

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Question - 27:

What is your ideal working environment?

Ans:

Describe your ideal working environment. Do you like flexibility with work hours? Do you like working in a cubicle or independently? Do you like to be micro managed or empowered? Do you like to work on your own or in a team? Do you like being driven by metrics in your role? How much responsibility do you want?

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Question - 28:

Why do you want to join our company?

Ans:

This is a question that is aimed at finding out whether you know enough about the company and the basic market. The best way to answer this question is to do some research on the company and highlight its positive points.

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Question - 29:

What will your ramp time be before you become a meaningful contributor?

Ans:

Companies want staff that can ramp quickly, but also want people who are realistic. So take into consideration how intense the job is and then give a good answer. For example, if you have simple responsibilities that don't require a huge development curve, then your ramp time will probably be shorter. If it's a complex set of skills that you need to develop, then your ramp time could be longer - the key is you have to explain why you believe that ramp time should be.

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Question - 30:

If you could offer suggestions on how to improve our company, what would you say?

Ans:

Examine the trends of the company and also where there may be some weaknesses (news articles often document this on public companies or look at their competitors to see how they're positioning it against them.) Then, once you have that knowledge, think creatively on how you could improve upon that weakness for them.

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Question - 31:

What is your greatest strength? How does it help you Regarding CAL Poly Pomona?

**Ans:**

One of my greatest strengths, and that I am a diligent worker... I care about the work getting done.. I am always willing to help others in the team.. Being patient helps me not jump to conclusions... Patience helps me stay calm when I have to work under pressure.. Being a diligent worker.. It ensures that the team has the same goals in accomplishing certain things.

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Question - 32:

If you look at a clock and the time is 3:15, what's the angle between the hour and the minute hands?

Ans:

Usually, if the answer to a brainteaser seems too easy, chances are the answer's wrong. And in this case, the answer is not zero degrees. The hour hand, remember, moves as well. That is, in addition to the minute hand. And so, at 3:15, the hour hand and the minute hand are not on top of each other. In fact, the hour hand has moved a quarter of the way between the 3 and 4. This means it's moved a quarter of 30 degrees (360 degrees divided by 12 equals 30). So the answer, to be exact, is seven and a half degrees (30 divided by four).

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Question - 33:

How have you shown yourself to be a leader?

Ans:

Think about a time where you've rallied a group of people around a cause / idea / initiative and successfully implemented it. It could be a small or large project but the key is you want to demonstrate how you were able to lead others to work for a common cause.

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Question - 34:

What is your perception of taking on risk?

Ans:

Your answer depends on the type of company you're interviewing for. If it's a start up, you need to be much more open to taking on risk. If it's a more established company, calculated risks to increase / improve the business or minimal risks would typically be more in line.

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Question - 35:

What are three positive characteristics you wish you had?

Ans:

The key here is to be honest about your wish list but then to describe how you plan on developing or growing those characteristics so that it becomes a reality. For example, I wish I had a stronger work ethic and I am reading a book right now about how to instill a better discipline around getting work done efficiently.

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Question - 36:

What do you aspire to be?

Ans:

Discuss your aspirations for the near, immediate and long term. You want to show them you are thinking of making an impact now as well as the future.

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Question - 37:

What are your salary requirements Regarding CAL Poly Pomona?

Ans:

The #1 rule of answering this question is doing your research on what you should be paid by using site like Global Guideline. You'll likely come up with a range, and we recommend stating the highest number in that range that applies, based on your experience, education, and skills. Then, make sure the hiring manager knows that you're flexible. You're communicating that you know your skills are valuable, but that you want the job and are willing to negotiate.

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Question - 38:

How do you deal with conflict in the workplace Regarding CAL Poly Pomona?

Ans:

When people work together, conflict is often unavoidable because of differences in work goals and personal styles. Follow these guidelines for handling conflict in the workplace.

- * 1. Talk with the other person.
- * 2. Focus on behavior and events, not on personalities.
- * 3. Listen carefully.
- * 4. Identify points of agreement and disagreement.
- * 5. Prioritize the areas of conflict.
- * 6. Develop a plan to work on each conflict.
- * 7. Follow through on your plan.
- * 8. Build on your success.

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**Question - 39:**

What challenges are you looking for in this position?

Ans:

A typical interview question to determine what you are looking for your in next job, and whether you would be a good fit for the position being hired for, is "What challenges are you looking for in a position Regarding CAL Poly Pomona?" The best way to answer questions about the challenges you are seeking is to discuss how you would like to be able to effectively utilize your skills and experience if you were hired for the job. You can also mention that you are motivated by challenges, have the ability to effectively meet challenges, and have the flexibility and skills necessary to handle a challenging job. You can continue by describing specific examples of challenges you have met and goals you have achieved in the past.

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Question - 40:

What is your greatest failure Regarding CAL Poly Pomona, and what did you learn from it?

Ans:

When I was in college, I took an art class to supplement my curriculum. I didn't take it very seriously, and assumed that, compared to my Engineering classes, it would be a walk in the park. My failing grades at midterm showed me otherwise. I'd even jeopardized my scholarship status. I knew I had to get my act together. I spent the rest of the semester making up for it, ended up getting a decent grade in the class. I learned that no matter what I'm doing, I should strive to do it to the best of my ability. Otherwise, it's not worth doing at all.

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Question - 41:

What are your thoughts on failure?

Ans:

Failure happens. It's a part of life. The key is understanding that you can't be perfect at everything and more importantly you're going to learn from failures to come out stronger.

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Question - 42:

Do you have the ability to articulate a vision and to get others involved to carry it out?

Ans:

If yes, then share an example of how you've done so at work or college. If not, then discuss how you would do so. Example: "I would first understand the goals of the staff members and then I would align those to the goals of the project / company. Then I would articulate the vision of that alignment and ask them to participate. From there, we would delegate tasks among the team and then follow up on a date and time to ensure follow through on the tasks. Lastly, we would review the results together."

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Question - 43:

Describe your vision of your perfect dream job?

Ans:

Ideally, the role you're applying for either is that dream job or will help you get to it. If it's going to help you get there, describe the elements of that job role that you are passionate about so that it ties to the vision of what your dream job is. Be honest and talk about the type of work environment, management team / leadership, coworkers, culture, vision and products/services you'd like your dream job to entail.

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Question - 44:

What is it about this position Regarding CAL Poly Pomona that attracts you the most?

Ans:

Use your knowledge of the job description to demonstrate how you are a suitable match for the role.

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Question - 45:

How have you achieved your success?

Ans:

Discuss stories of how you've progressed over the years to achieve success. People relate best to stories.

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Question - 46:

Who are your role models? Why?

Ans:

If possible, cite role models you're truly passionate about - passion is contagious and will show you're being genuine. If the role model is in the same or similar industry as the company in an executive level position, even better.

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Question - 47:

How would you estimate the weight of the Chrysler building?



Ans:

This is a process guesstimate where the interviewer wants to know if you know what to ask. First, you would find out the dimensions of the building (height, weight, depth). This will allow you to determine the volume of the building. Does it taper at the top? (Yes.) Then, you need to estimate the composition of the Chrysler building. Is it mostly steel? Concrete? How much would those components weigh per square inch? Remember the extra step: find out whether you're considering the building totally empty or with office furniture, people, etc. If you're including the contents, you might have to add 20 percent or so to the building's weight.

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Question - 48:

Describe your work style?

Ans:

Describe the positive aspects of your work style if possible, including: work ethic, attention to detail, interpersonal skills, skill sets (analytical or otherwise), leadership abilities, communication skills.

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Question - 49:

What did you major in and why?

Ans:

Tell them your major and the motivations behind why you chose it and how it's helped to prep you for this potential job.

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Question - 50:

How would your former employer describe you?

Ans:

In all likelihood, the interviewer will actually speak with your former employer so honesty is key. Answer as confidently and positively as possible and list all of the positive things your past employer would recognize about you. Do not make the mistake of simply saying you are responsible, organized, and dependable. Instead, include traits that are directly related to your work as a medical assistant, such as the ability to handle stressful situations and difficult patients, the way you kept meticulous records, and more.

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Question - 51:

How do you feel about technology at the workplace in general?

Ans:

It's a great enabler for us to collaborate better as a team, for us to reach customers more efficiently and frequently and I believe it can help any company become more efficient, leaner, and more productive.

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Question - 52:

How articulate are you in expressing your ideas?

Ans:

One of the best ways to answer this question is clearly articulate three points that demonstrate how articulate you are (and in a sense show that in a live setting) - for example: "I would say I'm articulate because one, I typically gather my thoughts before speaking, two, I organize my thoughts well, and three I'm concise when making a point.

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Question - 53:

What would you like to have accomplished by the end of your career?

Ans:

Think of 3 major achievements that you'd like to accomplish in your job when all is said and done - and think BIG. You want to show you expect to be a major contributor at the company. It could be creating a revolutionary new product, it could be implementing a new effective way of marketing, etc.

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Question - 54:

What's a time you exercised leadership?

Ans:

Depending on what's more important for the role, you'll want to choose an example that showcases your project management skills (spearheading a project from end to end, juggling multiple moving parts) or one that shows your ability to confidently and effectively rally a team. And remember: "The best stories include enough detail to be believable and memorable." Show how you were a leader in this situation and how it represents your overall leadership experience and potential.

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Question - 55:

Where do you see yourself professionally five years from now Regarding CAL Poly Pomona?

Ans:

Demonstrate both loyalty and ambition in the answer to this question. After sharing your personal ambition, it may be a good time to ask the interviewer if your ambitions match those of the company.



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Question - 56:

How would you motivate your team members to produce the best possible results?

Ans:

Trying to create competitive atmosphere, trying to motivate the team as a whole, organizing team building activities, building good relationships amongst people.

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Question - 57:

Why should we hire you as this position Regarding CAL Poly Pomona?

Ans:

This is the part where you link your skills, experience, education and your personality to the job itself. This is why you need to be utterly familiar with the job description as well as the company culture. Remember though, it's best to back them up with actual examples of say, how you are a good team player.

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Question - 58:

What was the most important task you ever had?

Ans:

There are two common answers to this question that do little to impress recruiters:

* 'I got a 2.1'

* 'I passed my driving test'

No matter how proud you are of these achievements, they don't say anything exciting about you. When you're going for a graduate job, having a degree is hardly going to make you stand out from the crowd and neither is having a driving licence, which is a requirement of many jobs.

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Question - 59:

How have you changed in the last five years?

Ans:

All in a nutshell. But I think I've attained a level of personal comfort in many ways and although I will change even more in the next 5-6 years I'm content with the past 6 and what has come of them.

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Question - 60:

How do you plan to go by an example for your subordinates?

Ans:

Sticking to the rules by yourself, working hard and not mind participating on basic tasks is a good answer.

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Question - 61:

How do you handle stressful situations?

Ans:

By remaining calm, weighing out all my options and executing a plan to get the situation resolve .

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Question - 62:

How do you act when you encounter competition?

Ans:

This question is designed to see if you can rise the occasion. You want to discuss how you are the type to battle competition strongly and then you need to cite an example if possible of your past work experience where you were able to do so.

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Question - 63:

How do you evaluate your ability to handle conflict?

Ans:

I pride myself on being a good problem solver. Through my previous job and management positions I have faced numerous conflicts in different situations, and my experiences have helped me to hone my issue resolution skills. I believe that it is important to get to and address the root of the issue, in a respectable manner.

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Question - 64:

Tell me something about your family background?

Ans:

First, always feel proud while discussing about your family background. Just simple share the details with the things that how they influenced you to work in an



airline field.

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Question - 65:

Do you have any questions for me?

Ans:

Good interview questions to ask interviewers at the end of the job interview include questions on the company growth or expansion, questions on personal development and training and questions on company values, staff retention and company achievements.

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Question - 66:

Why are you leaving your current job?

Ans:

This is a toughie, but one you can be sure you'll be asked. Definitely keep things positive-you have nothing to gain by being negative about your past employers. Instead, frame things in a way that shows that you're eager to take on new opportunities and that the role you're interviewing for is a better fit for you than your current or last position. For example, "I'd really love to be part of product development from beginning to end, and I know I'd have that opportunity here." And if you were let go? Keep it simple: "Unfortunately, I was let go," is a totally OK answer.

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Question - 67:

How do you keep each member of the team involved and motivated?

Ans:

Many managers mistakenly think that money is the prime motivator for their employees. However, according to surveys by several different companies, money is consistently ranked five or lower by most employees. So if money is not the best way to motivate your team, what is?

Employees' three most important issues according to employees are:

- * Respect
- * A sense of accomplishment
- * Recognition

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Question - 68:

How good are you at problem solving?

Ans:

Describe the problem first and then discuss how you were able to fix it.

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Question - 69:

Explain me about a time when you reached a goal within a tight deadline?

Ans:

I work well under pressure to meet deadlines without jeopardizing the quality of my work. I have always worked in a fast pace environment where we are constantly under pressure to achieve best results within a time frame.

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Question - 70:

What are your salary expectations Regarding CAL Poly Pomona?

Ans:

This question is like a loaded gun, tricky and dangerous if you're not sure what you are doing. It's not uncommon for people to end up talking salary before really selling their skills, but knowledge is power as this is a negotiation after all. Again, this is an area where doing your research will be helpful as you will have an understanding of average salary.

One approach is asking the interviewer about the salary range, but to avoid the question entirely, you can respond that money isn't a key factor and your goal is to advance in your career. However, if you have a minimum figure in mind and you believe you're able to get it, you may find it worth trying.

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Question - 71:

Do you have good computer skills?

Ans:

It is becoming increasingly important for medical assistants to be knowledgeable about computers. If you are a long-time computer user with experience with different software applications, mention it. It is also a good idea to mention any other computer skills you have, such as a high typing rate, website creation, and more.

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Question - 72:

Explain an idea that you have had and have then implemented in practice?

Ans:

Often an interview guide will outline the so-called 'STAR' approach for answering such questions; Structure the answer as a situation, task, action, and result: what



the context was, what you needed to achieve, what you did, and what the outcome was as a result of your actions.

Question - 73:

What do you know about the company?

Ans:

Any candidate can read and regurgitate the company's "About" page. So, when interviewers ask this, they aren't necessarily trying to gauge whether you understand the mission—they want to know whether you care about it. Start with one line that shows you understand the company's goals, using a couple key words and phrases from the website, but then go on to make it personal. Say, "I'm personally drawn to this mission because..." or "I really believe in this approach because..." and share a personal example or two.

What is your biggest achievement?

Ans:

(e.g., "I think a great starter project would be diving into your email marketing campaigns and setting up a tracking system for them.") Sure, if you get the job, you (or your new employer) might decide there's a better starting place, but having an answer prepared will show the interviewer where you can add immediate impact—and that you're excited to get started.

Question - 78:
