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#### Question - 1:

Are you willing to work overtime or odd hours?

#### Ans:

Be completely honest. You don't want to lie to get the job if you're not going to work the hours required.

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#### Question - 2:

What has disappointed you about a previous job?

#### Ans:

Again, this question could get you in trouble so tread carefully. Some good answers might be that your previous job didn't provide any room for growth, that you were laid off due to a mandatory reduction in staff, that they closed their office in your state and required you to relocate, etc. Make sure not to mention anything negative about the people you worked with, the company in general or the job itself.

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#### Question - 3:

What's the difference between good and exceptionally great?

#### Ans:

Being good is getting the job done as promised As Manager Research Development (Non-Technical). Being great is delivering the work in an exceptional way that completely exceeds expectations.

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#### Question - 4:

What did you like least about your last (or current) job As Manager Research Development (Non-Technical)?

#### Ans:

Don't vent or focus on the negative with brutally honest answers such as "My boss was a jerk," or "The company culture was too politically correct," or "They just weren't giving me the opportunity to take my career to the next level." Instead, keep the emphasis on the positive, even though there are sure to be things you weren't happy about.

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#### Question - 5:

What is your greatest professional achievement?

#### Ans:

Nothing says "hire me" better than a track record of achieving amazing results in past jobs As Manager Research Development (Non-Technical), so don't be shy when answering this interview question! A great way to do so is by using the S-T-A-R method: Set up the situation and the task that you were required to complete to provide the interviewer with background context (e.g., "In my last job as a Manager Research Development (Non-Technical), it was my role to manage the invoicing process"), but spend the bulk of your time describing what you actually did (the action) and what you achieved (the result). For example, "In one month, I streamlined the process, which saved my group 10 man-hours each month and reduced errors on invoices by 25%."

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#### Question - 6:

How do you stay organized?

#### Ans

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#### Question - 7:

Would you like doing repetitive work?

#### Ans.

Why not, I am not only doing a repetitive work but also earning but also getting a good salary by the company As Manager Research Development (Non-Technical). And second thing is that nothing is interesting in the life till we are not interested.

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#### Question - 8:

How do you think your colleagues at your last job would describe you?

#### Anc.

While your CV will say a lot about your work history As Manager Research Development (Non-Technical), the interviewer will most likely look for greater detail with questions such as this. Be positive about previous experience, highlighting your own strengths.

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#### Question - 9:

How would your boss and co-workers describe you?

#### Ane:

First of all, be honest (remember, if you get this job, the hiring manager will be calling your former bosses and co-workers!). Then, try to pull out strengths and traits you haven't discussed in other aspects of the interview As Manager Research Development (Non-Technical), such as your strong work ethic or your willingness to pitch in on other projects when needed.

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#### Question - 10:

If you could do it all over again, how would you plan your academic studies differently?

#### Ans:

Whatever you do, just don't act bitter. A lot of times we wish we could change the past, but focus on the positive reasons and results of the decisions you already made.

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#### Question - 11:

What relevant work experience do you have in this career field As Manager Research Development (Non-Technical)?

#### Ans:

Talk about specific work related experience for the position you're interviewing for. Make sure the experience is relevant. Don't talk about previous experience that is not related to the position in question. If you don't have specific career related experience speak about prior experience that has helped you develop the specific knowledge and skills required for the position you are applying for.

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#### Question - 12:

What kind of work interests you the most?

#### Ans:

You can talk about what you're passionate about. What motivates you. What excites you.

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#### Question - 13:

Describe your management style?

#### Ans:

Try to avoid specific classifications, whatever it may be. Organizations usually prefer managers who can adapt their skills to different situations.

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#### Question - 14:

How do you believe you would benefit our organization?

#### Δns:

This is a great question that provides you the opportunity to put your best foot forward, to tell the interviewer why he or she should consider hiring you for the job. Make sure you're well prepared for this question as you won't likely get a second chance to really shine.

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#### Question - 15:

Who has been an inspiration for you?

#### Ans:

Cite your role models (possible examples could be your parents, people successful in the industry, world leaders, etc)

#### Question - 16:

Tell me about a time you failed?

#### Ans:

Everyone has failed, so don't play dumb or claim you've never messed up As Manager Research Development (Non-Technical). Think of a time when a work-related situation didn't turn out quite as you had hoped. An interviewer is interested in seeing how you took responsibility for your failure, what you learned from it, and how you would prevent similar failures from happening again.

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#### Question - 18:

Describe your work ethic?

While discussing this, be sure to stress specific examples of what you bring to the company. Good qualities include resolve to fulfill job responsibilities, optimism, and a desire to be as efficient as possible while at work.

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#### Question - 19:

Describe some problems you encountered in your most recent position As Manager Research Development (Non-Technical) and how you resolved them?

#### Ans:

Discuss your work experiences. The key is to show you're calm under pressure and can handle sensitive situations with a clear train of thought.

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#### Question - 20:

What is your greatest achievement outside of work As Manager Research Development (Non-Technical)?

#### Ans:

This is a great opportunity for you to discuss how you've given back to the community, how you've achieved in a competitive extracurricular activity (think sports or clubs), how you've mentored others, and so forth.

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#### Question - 21:

What's your management style?

#### Ans:

The best managers are strong but flexible, and that's exactly what you want to show off in your answer. (Think something like, "While every situation and every team member requires a bit of a different strategy, I tend to approach my employee relationships as a coach...") Then, share a couple of your best managerial moments, like when you grew your team from five to 15 or coached an underperforming employee to become the company's top employee.

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#### Question - 22:

Where do you see your career in five years As Manager Research Development (Non-Technical)?

#### Δns

I would like to retire from this company. I would like to make a difference in the company whether in the company or any other position or area of the company As Manager Research Development (Non-Technical).

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#### Question - 23:

Do you consider yourself successful?

#### Ans:

You should always answer yes to this question. Briefly explain why without going on and on. If you communicate that you're more successful than you really are you may come off as arrogant or unrealistic. A goof explanation is that you have set professional goals and that you have met some of these goals and are on track to meet more in the near future.

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#### Question - 24:

What can you offer me that another person can't?



#### Ans:

This is when you talk about your record of getting things done. Go into specifics from your resume and portfolio; show an employer your value and how you'd be an asset.

You have to say, "I'm the best person for the job As Manager Research Development (Non-Technical). I know there are other candidates who could fill this position, but my passion for excellence sets me apart from the pack. I am committed to always producing the best results. For example..."

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#### Question - 25:

What's the last book you read?

#### Ans:

Try to talk about a book related to the industry, for example, if you're applying for a role related to business, cite a business book.

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#### Question - 26:

Explain what are your weaknesses As Manager Research Development (Non-Technical)?

#### Ans:

Red flags: This is the peanut butter to the previous question's jelly. Again, everyone should expect it, so it's a bad sign if someone seems totally unprepared, or gives a stock answer like, "I'm a perfectionist." Also, of course, candidates crazy enough to blurt out some horrible personality trait should go in the red flagged pile. Good answer: Candidates should talk about a real weakness they've been working on improving. For instance, they're not good at public speaking, but they've been taking a course to help them improve. Or maybe they feel that they're easily distracted when working online, but have installed software that helps them stay on task. Answers like these show a desire for improvement, self awareness and discipline.

#### Question - 27:

Why are you leaving the present company?

#### Δns.

According to me we can not grow in the field without taking more responsibilities and risks and also we can't enhance our team leading capabilities, managerial skills without expose to wide range of people.

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#### Question - 28:

What's been your biggest failure to date?

#### Ans:

Describe your biggest failure and discuss what you've learned from it and ideally how you've been successful since because of that lesson.

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#### Question - 29:

What differentiates this company from other competitors?

#### Ans:

Be positive and nice about their competitors but also discuss how they are better than them and why they are the best choice for the customer. For example: "Company XYZ has a good product, but I truly believe your company has a 3-5 year vision for your customer that aligns to their business needs."

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#### Question - 30:

Why do you want to join our company?

#### Ans:

This is a question that is aimed at finding out whether you know enough about the company and the basic market. The best way to answer this question is to do some research on the company and highlight its positive points.

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#### Question - 31:

What is your biggest fear?

#### Ans:

Don't try to sugarcoat the answer by listing something ambitious as a fear, unless you truly mean it (for example: I fear being a great leader) - Share your real fears but discuss how you would overcome them.

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#### Question - 32:

What does your professional network look like?

#### Ans:

If you have a professional network, discuss it detail (# of contacts, people you know, their positions and what you've learned from them or how you've worked with them). If you don't have one, discuss how you would develop one (career fairs, networking events for that industry, through your existing friends, etc)



#### Question - 33:

How do you feel about this company's vision?

#### Ane-

First find out where the company envisions itself in 3-5 years. If you can't find the vision of the company, that's probably a big question mark on the company itself. Once you do, identify how those company's visions align to your personal values and goals and then articulate how tightly correlated that is to the interviewer. For example - this company wants to be the #1 provider of green technology in the world and I feel strongly about that vision because we've got a chance to collectively impact the world to become a greener society and save our clients at the same time!

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#### Question - 34:

Do you like being around people?

#### Ans:

People skills are a necessity for medical assistants. When answering this question, be sure to show that you enjoy interacting and working with others and that you also derive great enjoyment from helping others. This will show that you are a team player and that you would be a valuable team member As Manager Research Development (Non-Technical).

#### Question - 35:

Why do you want to work in this industry As Manager Research Development (Non-Technical)?

#### Ane

Make sure you research the industry first. Then find at least 3 core things about that industry that you're passionate about (for example: how their solutions impact clients, their culture, the leadership, etc)

What differentiates you from the competition?

#### Ane.

Think about what you bring to the table that you truly believe is unique - the easiest way to do is to think of your own personal stories that demonstrate your work ethic, skills, and dedication. Most people have some or all of those skills, but the unique stories are what make people stand out in interviews.

#### Question - 37:

What are your lifelong dreams?

#### Ans:

If your dreams don't relate to the job closely, make sure you highlight aspects of the job that will help develop the skills that will help you with your dreams. Ideally, you want your dreams to relate strongly to the career path you're interviewing for though.

Was there a person in your career who really made a difference?

#### Ans

If you can't think of one, you need to get a mentor QUICKLY! Mentors can come in the form of peers, family members, co-workers, management / leaders at a company and so on.

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#### Question - 39:

Tell me about the last time you missed a goal or deadline?

#### Ans:

Unless you're a completely perfect person, chances are you've messed up before on a goal/deadline. If so, discuss how you fell short and what you would have done in retrospect to achieve it.

Describe yourself in three words?

#### Ans:

Pick three adjectives but then back up each with a real life story that demonstrates those characteristics.

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#### Question - 41:

How meticulous are you with details?

#### Ans:

Being detailed is important for many types of job roles. Typically you want to highlight how you've done that in previous roles. Example: "Being meticulous is important to me. In my last job, I had to count the money in the register as a cashier to make sure it matched to the receipts down to the last penny." This was to



ensure there wasn't any "wrongdoing" at the company by any of the cashiers and I was always accurate in my reports.

How would you be an asset to us As Manager Research Development (Non-Technical)?

#### Ane.

Think again about the job specification and the skills needed for this role As Manager Research Development (Non-Technical). Have a paragraph prepared highlighting how you will be able to do the job and what you can bring to the team. It goes without saying that this paragraph should be positive.

#### Ans:

Interpersonal relationships are a very important part of being a successful care assistant. This question is seeking a solid example of how you have used powers of persuasion to achieve a positive outcome in a professional task or situation. The answer should include specific details.

#### Question - 47:

Describe your academic achievements?

#### Ans

Think of a time where you really stood out and shined within college. It could be a leadership role in a project, it could be your great grades that demonstrate your intelligence and discipline, it could be the fact that you double majored. Where have you shined?

What other companies are you interviewing with?

#### Ans:

Companies ask this for a number of reasons, from wanting to see what the competition is for you to sniffing out whether you're serious about the industry. "Often the best approach is to mention that you are exploring a number of other similar options in the company's industry,". It can be helpful to mention that a common characteristic of all the jobs you are applying to is the opportunity to apply some critical abilities and skills that you possess. For example, you might say 'I am applying for several positions with IT consulting firms where I can analyze client needs and translate them to development teams in order to find solutions to technology problems.'

#### Ans:

Think about what you need to learn going into the job. Skill sets, industry knowledge, relationship building, team dynamics. Which areas are ones you're lacking?

#### Question - 51:

Describe a time where you've failed and bounced back?

#### Ans:

Share a story to describe this. For example: "I accidentally made the mistake of telling a customer I could deliver on a solution set on a certain date and then later found out our business partner couldn't do it on that time. I learned that I shouldn't rush into important decisions and promises like this and that I should always check with my counterparts first before committing to a statement of work."

#### Question - 52:

What role do you see technology playing in this role?

#### Ans:

Technology is important to almost every job today but it's not meant to be abused. I believe it's important to increase productivity and not for personal use.

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#### Question - 53:

Rate yourself on a scale of 10?

#### Ans:

If you truly believe you're a 10, you better be able to explain why with examples / stories. If you believe you're a great contributor and have room to grow, say 8 or 9. If you're below that, explain what you would do to improve yourself to get the ranking you believe you can be.

#### Question - 54:

What are your salary expectations As Manager Research Development (Non-Technical)?

#### Ans:

This question is like a loaded gun, tricky and dangerous if you're not sure what you are doing. It's not uncommon for people to end up talking salary before really selling their skills, but knowledge is power as this is a negotiation after all. Again, this is an area where doing your research will be helpful as you will have an understanding of average salary.

One approach is asking the interviewer about the salary range, but to avoid the question entirely, you can respond that money isn't a key factor and you're goal is to advance in your career. However, if you have a minimum figure in mind and you believe you're able to get it, you may find it worth trying.

#### Question - 55:

How many square feet of pizza are eaten in the United States each month?

#### Ans:

This is a classic guesstimate question where you need to think aloud. And so first off you round the U.S. population to 300 million people (it's actually about 315 million but rounding will be much easier and your interviewer will not score you lower for rounding). Then estimate how many people eat pizza. A decent educated guess is two out of every three people, or 200 million. Now let's say the average pizza-eating person eats pizza twice a month, and eats two slices at a time. That's four slices a month. If the average slice of pizza is perhaps six inches at the base and 10 inches long, then the slice is 30 square inches of pizza. So, four pizza slices would be 120 square inches (30 times 4).

Since one square foot equals 144 square inches (12 times 12), let's assume that each person who eats pizza eats one square foot per month. Since there are 200 million pizza-eating Americans, 200 million square feet of pizza are consumed in the U.S. each month. To summarize: 300 million people in America, 200 million eat pizza, average slice of pizza is six inches at the base and 10 inches long or 30 square inches, average American eats four slices of pizza a month, four pieces times 30 square inches equals 120 square inches (one square foot is 144 square inches), so let's assume one square foot per person, and thus one square foot times 200 million people equals 200 million square feet of pizza a month.

#### Question - 56:

There's no right or wrong answer, but if you could be anywhere in the world right now, where would you be?

#### Ans:

Just be honest about where you'd like to be - you never know - you may end up bonding with the interviewer with the location. However, you want to stress that you want to work out of the location that you're interviewing for.

What types of personalities do you work with best?

#### Ans:

In the past, I have found it difficult to work with others who see themselves as better than others, who can take criticism, and who refuse to work with others. I have found it challenging to work with them b/c I am a team oriented person who feels the importance of working together over the needs of the individual especially in a learning environment.



#### Question - 58:

Does your boss know you're here today?

#### Ane-

Usually, you probably haven't told your boss for obvious reasons. So it's ok to say that they do not. You don't want to upset the balance at your current job after all and nothing is guaranteed in an interview. The interviewer should understand this stance.

#### Ans:

Managing different personalities and keeping them focused on the goal at hand.

You don't want the interviewer to think that you'll speak negatively about this job or the company should you eventually decide to move on after they have hired you.

How do you act when you encounter competition?

#### Ans

This question is designed to see if you can rise the occasion. You want to discuss how you are the type to battle competition strongly and then you need to cite an example if possible of your past work experience where you were able to do so.

#### Question - 65:

Have you got any questions?

#### Ans:

This is your final opportunity to persuade the interviewer that you are the right candidate for the job. Now is not the time to ask questions about holidays, pay or pensions - all these things can be asked later when you get an offer of employment. Now is the time to ask about any reservations that the interviewer may have about your suitability for the role. You will then give yourself one last chance to persuade the interviewer that you are the right candidate for the job.

Example Thank you. I think we have covered everything. Before we finish the interview I would like to take the opportunity to ask if you have any reservations about my suitability for this role?

Give me an example of when you competed hard and won?

#### Ans:

You can reference many different areas here when discussing a story of where you won in competition: Work experience (ideal), sports, clubs, classes, projects.



#### Question - 67:

What do you look for in terms of culture -- structured or entrepreneurial?

#### Anc.

A good answer is to discuss the importance of having both elements in a company As Manager Research Development (Non-Technical). Structure is good to maintain a focus on priorities and making sure people are productive but having an entrepreneurial spirit can help cultivate new ideas that can truly help the company.

How would you define success?

#### Ans:

Success is defined differently for everybody. Just make sure the parameters are defined by you with regards to work life balance, financial gain, career growth, achievements, creating meaningful work / products and so forth. If you can clearly articulate what it means to you that is a strong answer.

Why are you leaving your current job?

#### Ans:

This is a toughie, but one you can be sure you'll be asked. Definitely keep things positive-you have nothing to gain by being negative about your past employers. Instead, frame things in a way that shows that you're eager to take on new opportunities and that the role you're interviewing for is a better fit for you than your current or last position. For example, "I'd really love to be part of product development from beginning to end, and I know I'd have that opportunity here." And if you were let go? Keep it simple: "Unfortunately, I was let go," is a totally OK answer.

#### Question - 78:

What would your first 30, 60, or 90 days look like in this role As Manager Research Development (Non-Technical)?

#### Ans:

Start by explaining what you'd need to do to get ramped up. What information would you need? What parts of the company would you need to familiarize yourself with? What other employees would you want to sit down with? Next, choose a couple of areas where you think you can make meaningful contributions right away. (e.g., "I think a great starter project would be diving into your email marketing campaigns and setting up a tracking system for them.")
